Tim Kliphuis Trio

The autumn season at **The Watson Institute** continues with the welcome return of the delectable and dulcet tones of the **Tim Kliphuis Trio** on **Sunday November 12th**. Award-winning Dutch violinist Tim's Trio with Nigel Clark on guitar and Roy Percy on bass celebrates 10 years of performing a ground-breaking and profoundly musical blend of gypsy jazz, classical and folk music around the world. This festive programme features the Trio's greatest successes, with music by Ellington, Fauré, Paganini, R. Strauss, Grappelli and Kliphuis himself, plus a selection from the new-released Vivaldi album, "Reflecting the Seasons".

Tim has been hailed as a contemporary improvising "Paganini" and has shared the stage with Richard Galliano, Frankie Gavin, Les Paul and many gypsy jazz groups including The Rosenberg Trio. Nigel is an awe-inspiring guitar virtuoso with a unique sound, and has worked with the biggest names in jazz, folk and rock including Gloria Gaynor, Moya Brennan, Jan Akkerman, Philip Catherine, Carla Bley, Steve Swallow and Scottish hit band Hue and Cry. Roy's bass sound is rooted in New Orleans and Jump-Jive, bringing the Trio raw street rhythms and infectious grooves. SCHOOL VANDALISM

The Parish Council has received disturbing reports from the staff of the village school detailing the extensive damage caused to the school's buildings and its grounds by vandals.

It seems that during the summer holidays both the roof of the main building and the roof of a shed were climbed on and damaged. Apparently 23 tiles have had to be replaced on the main building and a new felt covering fitted to the shed. Sadly, I understand that this felt roof has been damaged once more and other damage has occurred since the start of term.

For many years the school grounds have doubled as a village playground, mainly during weekends and school holidays but also on summer evenings during the long daylight hours. It has always been a safe place for children to play unsupervised. This privilege is now under threat because of the actions of the vandals. The recurring expense of repairs means that money has to be diverted away from education and the children find it very upsetting to have their school damaged in this way. Also, it seems that Ofsted take a dim view of schools with minimal security. Because the school are not only having to take steps to head off any threat from Ofsted but also to deal with repeated vandalism, they have appealed to the Parish Council for help in funding a CCTV system. They hope that this would help with both.

More urgently, in the meantime, both the School and the Parish Council would like to enlist the help of villagers in catching the vandals and putting a stop to the damage. For example, it is known that lots of people walk their dogs in the area close to the school, so if they could act as 'a pair of eyes' to spot any damaging behaviour such as children clampering up on to a roof or 'playing' in the school garden and then would report it, with names if known, to the school's staff by ringing 01228 670393 we may see a speedy end to the problem. Likewise, if those parents whose children use the playground out of school hours could perhaps ask their children to also keep an eye out and report back (in confidence) that would also be helpful.

It is important that this vandalism stops to ensure the continued availability of this play area for many years to come. Please be vigilant. *George Devereux, Chairman of the Parish Council*

Archers Actors Fly in for Play Premiere

Croglin Village Hall will be the venue for the premiere of a new play by local author Sharon Gosling. *The Earth from the Air* is set to star Sean Connolly — who plays Keith Horrobin in *The Archers* — and Bella Hamblin, who has also been heard in *The Archers*, as well as opposite her husband Sean in Radio 4's popular drama *Home Front*.

"*The Earth from the Air* is the story of what happens when Gabe, a woman with a fear of flying, confronts her fears by trying to learn to fly out of Carlisle airport. Sean plays Huw, her flying instructor," says Sharon, who lives in Croglin. "But the play also encompasses a little of the history of the fells around the village."

"Because the play was written for radio, that's how it will be performed, as a 'live radio play'," Sharon adds. "That means the actors will have their scripts with them and their performances will be augmented by sound effects and music that has been composed specially for this production. We've had great support from the local community as well Eden Arts, the council and several local businesses. Sean and Bella are kindly donating their services, too, so all the proceeds will be going to the Village Hall, which is celebrating its 80th anniversary this year, to help keep it going as an important centre of village life for another 80 years."

There are just two performances of this hour-long 'live radio play', on **Friday 27th and Saturday 28th of October**. Tickets are £12 each, and include dinner before the show: attendees, who should arrive for 7.30pm, will receive a Pie and a Pint, as well as the Play! Sean Connolly is an actor & voice artist known for voicing 10 characters in Aardman's Oscar, Golden Globe and BAFTA-nominated movie *Shaun the Sheep*, and also playing Hector the Llama in their Emmy-winning 2015 Christmas Special *Shaun the Sheep: The Farmer's Llamas*. He plays 'the Ambridge Fire-Starter' Keith Horrobin in *The Archers*, and has also appeared in many *Doctor Who* audio dramas — where he first worked with Sharon Gosling.

Bella Hamblin has been an actress for almost 25 years, working in television, film, theatre and radio drama. Her television appearances include *Emmerdale*, *The Forsyte Saga* and *A Touch of Frost*, while her radio credits include *The Archers*, and *Home Front*, in which she and her husband Sean Connolly play Hilda and Ernie Moore.

Sharon Gosling's books include the trilogy *The Diamond Thief* (which won the Redbridge Children's Award in 2014), *The Ruby Airship* and *The Sapphire Cutlass*, the teen horror novel *FIR*, and official TV tie-in titles for the popular CBBC series, *Wolf Blood*. Sharon writes books and articles about television and film, and has written, produced and directed audio dramas. Sharon lives in the village of Croglin, in Cumbria.

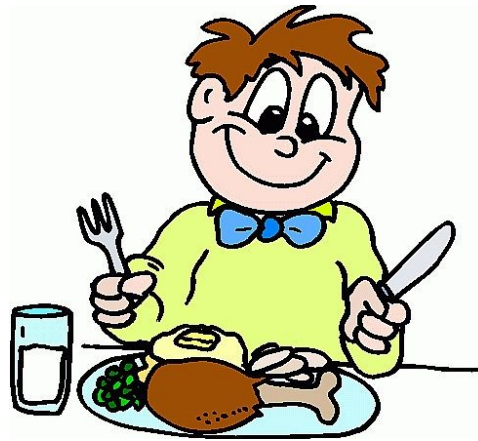

Music on the Marr 2017

Along with unwelcome torrential rain and wind, fine folk and roots music returned to Castle Carrock in July for the eighth Music on the Marr festival. As in previous years, there was an international feel to proceedings with Africa in particular admirably represented by the infectious soukous dance music of Kanda Bongo Man and the African-tinged reggae of Zimbabwean Mbira Vibes, who made it feel sunny even if the weather disagreed. For those festival goers enchanted by such sounds, there was the serendipitous opportunity to attend an entertaining talk by the legendary music broadcaster Andy Kershaw, who described his part in bringing so-called World Music onto the British airwaves. Its' quite a story!

As at every other MoM, festival organiser Richard Johnstone mined the seemingly unending lode of exciting Scottish performers around today. A reinvented version of the Celtic-rock pioneers Wolfstone blasted the tent away on Saturday night and were rapturously received, while on the final evening a highly talented trio called Talisk came at their tradition from a gentler but no less exuberant direction, featuring outstanding concertina work from Stornoway's Mohsen Amini.

There were of course English acts in abundance also. Encouragingly, there appears to be as rich a vein of young, highly talented performers this side of the border as there is north of it. There was some remarkably virtuosic banjo playing from Dan Walsh, while the affecting singing of Lucy Ward brought a hush to the marquee. The performance of her own composition, Lion, about a WWI soldier shot for cowardice, was memorably haunting. At the other end of the age spectrum was a joyful set from the evergreen Roy Bailey who, as festival patron, performs every year to a packed audience which seems to respond to the hope and humour he brings to music whatever their own political allegiances.

There was considerable local interest to be had this year. Tom Speight and Ian Brown put on a fascinating show combining song, poetry, prose and photographs to tell the story of the construction in the early 1900s of a reservoir in Castle Carrock and the pipeline feeding Carlisle. Focussing on the hardships facing the many navvies involved it was highly illuminating and moving. There was also a storming set from accomplished folk-rockers Hadrian's Union, who have played in various guises at MoM since its inception. Now with a new lineup but still headed by Castle Carrock's Stew Simpson, this is the most exciting version yet!

The highlight for me this year was the duet comprising the much lauded Welsh classical harpist Catrin Finch and the Senegalese kora player Seckou Keita. The marriage of these two ancient instruments and musical cultures was listened to in adoring silence by an audience clearly enchanted by the uniqueness of the sound. The interplay between two such virtuoso performers is quite astonishing and creates a new genre all of its own. Their set offered probably the most beautiful music heard at any MoM to date.

The weekend's closing act, The Urban Folk Quartet, therefore had a hard act to follow but did their duty admirably, bringing the house down with a raucous, wild and quirky set of fiddle driven madness to finish off another highly successful Music on the Marr. What a gift to North Cumbrian culture this event continues to be. *Gary Weston*

Resting well

Numbers in the Bible often carry meaning or symbolism.

In an assembly this morning we were focussing on the number seven, a number which can denote wholeness, completion and even perfection when used in the scriptures. We thought about one of the stories of creation at the beginning of Genesis in the Old Testament, the story in which six days of creation culminate in a seventh day of rest, a sabbath day.

Wholeness is arrived at not only through working well, but also through the renewal that a time of rest brings – a time to enjoy the gifts of life and the Giver of life.

I asked the children what day from the school holidays they would like to repeat if they could. Both children who responded spoke of days spent with family, one walking abroad and coming across a beautiful lake, one visiting a vibrant city. I thought about which day I would repeat myself, and thought of days away with family experiencing this amazing world we've been given to live in.

I was re-assured that no one wanted to repeat a day spent in front of the x-box or some other screen!

As human beings made in the image of God we have a vocation both to work well and also to rest well. Neither is easy, and sometimes circumstances conspire to frustrate us. But we should never give up on aspiring to find time, sabbath time, in which we can cultivate gratitude and wonder for what still can be a wonderful life in a wonderful world. And to be able to do that in the company of those we love is a blessing indeed.

To do so in the company of God, whose beauty and truth is our deepest need, and in the company of other human beings, each of whom is also uniquely made in God's image, is what the church aspires to. *Edward Johnsen*
